

Even though neutral Spanish is understood by all Spanish-speaking countries, sometimes it is necessary to translate into a regional type of Spanish...something the target audience will feel comfy with. This is why we have implemented the Regional Spanish selector, so you can choose which type of Spanish you want to use.

Click on *Tools*, and go to *Options*. There, under *GENERAL*, is a subcategory called **REGIONAL LANGUAGE**, for both English and Spanish. If you click on the arrow next to them, you can see all the different regional types available. Let's check out the options for Spanish: clicking on any of these will make the Translator prefer a term from this region if available within the program's database. Let's click on **MEXICO** and see what happens. Click on OK, close the Options window, and type:

*The only thing they sell here is **beer**.*

Beer will most surely have a regional word for it in Mexico; by clicking on the interactive button, you can see all other available Spanish options for BEER, plus your selection with a little Mexican flag beside it. As you can see, the program is preferring this term by using it first, per your instructions. If you hadn't set a regional language, the program default would have been CERVEZA.
